

Summer Work - Incoming 6th Graders

This is the summer assignment for the **incoming 6th graders**. The students need to complete the writing prompts, choose and memorize one of the poems along with written response for poem, read two of the novels, and complete math challenge questions & lessons reviews in preparation for the diagnostic assessment that takes place during the first week of school.

Writing

<u>Directions</u>: Please get a **new** composition book (**you will be using this notebook during the year**) and answer at least **two** from **each** of the following writing styles: Expository, Descriptive, Narrative.

<u>Please Note</u>: If you have answered any of these prompts for a previous summer writing assignment, please choose different prompts.

Expository

- 1. Explain how disappointments can sometimes have a positive outcome.
- 2. Each child has a unique place in their family. Explain the advantages and disadvantages of the position you hold in your family (youngest child, an only child, middle child etc.)..
- 3. A home in your neighborhood has burned. The family lost everything in the fire, but everyone came out safely. Inform your reader how you plan to help the family recover from the loss.
- 4. Explain why honesty is important in a friendship.
- 5. Compare and contrast your home in the day versus the night. Think not only about how it looks different, but also how it sounds different, as well as how your home serves a different purpose in the day than it does at night.

Descriptive

- 1. Describe your bedroom. Start with what is immediately to your left when you open the door and describe what you see as you go clockwise around your room.
- 2. While visiting the zoo you encounter an animal that no one has ever seen before. Describe the animal.
- 3. What is your favorite meal? Describe it in detail, including what it looks, smells, and tastes like.
- 4. Describe a tree in detail. Maybe it is your favorite tree, one you like to climb, or one that has a tire swing. Describe what it looks like, feels like, and even its smell.
- 5. Describe a thunderstorm to someone who has never experienced one. Give details about what you see, hear, and smell. Be sure to describe how you feel during the storm.

Narrative

- 1. Tell what happened when you felt proudest of yourself.
- 2. Imagine that you spent the entire day with your favorite relative (grandmother, grandfather, cousin, aunt, uncle, etc). Tell us about your day.



- 3. Imagine that you were invisible for a day. Write about your experience.
- 4. Retell a popular fairy tale from the villain's point of view.
- 5. When was the last time you showed great courage? Tell us about your experience.

Poetry

<u>Directions</u>: 1) <u>Choose</u> and <u>memorize</u> **one** of the following poems. You will be asked to recite this poem from memory at the beginning of school. 2) Write a one-paragraph reader's response about the poem you chose, in your composition notebook (the same notebook you used for your writing).
